Optimizing Organizational Success in Public Universities in Niger Delta Region through Strategic Human Resource Planning

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Abstract

The study investigated "Optimizing Organizational Success in Public Universities of the Niger Delta Region through Strategic Human Resource Planning." This research employed a descriptive study design. The population of the study covers the entire male and female academic staff of public universities within the Niger Delta Region. The sample size of 3,116 academic staffs, comprises of 1,821 (58.4%) male and 1,295 (41.6%) female academic staff, was drawn using stratified random sampling technique focusing on 9 public universities within the Niger Delta Region. University of Port Harcourt-Choba, Imo State University, Delta State University, University of Uyo, Niger Delta University, University of Calabar, Ambrose Alli University Edo, Adekunle Ajasin University Ondo, Abia State University. The utilized a self-structured questionnaire, titled "Organizational Success Through Human Resource Planning Questionnaire (OSHRPQ) to collect information from the respondents. The questionnaire maintains its two sections: Section 'A' collected demographic data; while Section 'B' comprised 25 questionnaire items addressing the 5 research questions and hypotheses. Respondents rated questionnaire items on a 4-point Likert scale, ranging from 1 (Strongly Disagree) to 4 (Strongly Agree). Measurement and Evaluation experts from the academic community validated the instruments to enhance the questionnaire quality and relevance. Thereafter, the reliability of the questionnaire is determined using Cronbach's alpha, which estimated an internal consistency coefficient of .821, indicating a high level of reliability. Descriptive statistics, such as means and standard deviations, was used to answer the research questions. While t-test statistic was employed to test research hypotheses at .05 level of significance. The study concluded that prioritizing human resource planning is crucial for ensuring the success and sustainability of these institutions. The study offers recommendations that university quality assurance bodies should encourage public universities to adopt effective performance evaluation practices to ensure the delivery of high-quality educational services, enhanced accountability, identify areas for improvement, and elevate the overall quality of universities in the Niger-Delta.

- There is no significant difference between the mean rating of male and female lecturers on how performance management and evaluation improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region.

In an ever-evolving academic and research environment, staying updated with the latest developments in various fields and adapting to evolving pedagogical methods is paramount (Snell & Bohlander, 2023). Public universities in the Niger Delta region require a workforce that can contribute to cutting-edge research, deliver quality education, and address regional challenges effectively. Therefore, investing in these programs aligns with the broader mission of these institutions.

Moreover, the Niger Delta region is characterized by specific regional challenges, including environmental concerns, ethnic diversity, and a history of resource-related conflicts (Ite, 2016). Training programs can be meticulously designed to equip staff with the necessary skills to address these challenges effectively. For example, specialized environmental studies

programs can contribute to addressing environmental and sustainability challenges in the region, aligning with the broader goals of public universities in promoting regional development. Furthermore, training and development programs significantly contribute to employee engagement and satisfaction. In an environment where staff turnover can be high, retaining talented individuals is a key factor for organizational success (Gowan, 2017). When employees are provided with opportunities for growth and development, they are more likely to be motivated, committed to their roles, and invested in the long-term success of the institution. Employee engagement is particularly crucial for public universities in the Niger Delta, where their effectiveness and impact directly affect the region's socio-economic development.

Succession Planning and Career Development

Succession planning and career development are fundamental elements of effective human resource planning in public universities, especially in a dynamic and challenging region like the Niger Delta. Succession planning, as a key aspect of organizational continuity, ensures that leadership and management roles within the institution are well-prepared for the future (Ololube, 2017). It is of great significance in an environment where experienced and capable leaders are essential for steering the universities through the complexities and opportunities that arise in the Niger Delta region. Career development, on the other hand, contributes significantly to employee satisfaction and retention. When employees see opportunities for growth and advancement within the organization, they are more likely to stay and remain committed to their roles (Mello, 2018). In the context of public universities, where the workforce is diverse and multifaceted, career development programs can cater to the specific needs of different employee groups, from teaching staff to researchers and administrators. This tailored approach to career development is especially significant in a region where the universities' ability to retain and nurture talent directly impacts their capacity to contribute to regional development. The significance of these elements in the success of public universities in the Niger Delta region becomes evident when considering their impact on the overall institutional effectiveness and stability. Succession planning ensures that there is a pool of qualified individuals ready to assume leadership roles, leading to institutional stability and continued progress. This is particularly crucial in an environment where universities serve as catalysts for socio-economic development and regional transformation.

Performance Management and Evaluation

Performance management and evaluation are fundamental aspects of human resource planning in public universities, particularly in the context of the Niger Delta region. These processes involve assessing employee performance and ensuring alignment with the institution's mission and strategic goals. Effective performance management and evaluation are of great significance for several reasons. First and foremost, they help identify areas for improvement and growth. By providing feedback to employees on their performance, universities can help them understand their strengths and weaknesses, allowing for targeted development efforts (Dessler, 2018). In an environment characterized by dynamic challenges and opportunities, the ability to adapt and improve is essential for organizational success.

In the Niger Delta region, performance management and evaluation processes can also contribute to addressing specific regional challenges, such as environmental conservation and sustainable resource management (Ite, 2016). Public universities in this region play a crucial role in addressing these challenges and promoting sustainable development, making it imperative to ensure that every employee's work contributes to these goals. Moreover, performance management and evaluation processes are significant for ensuring that employees' efforts are aligned with the institution's mission and strategic goals. Public universities are central to the socio-economic development of the Niger Delta (Breaugh, 2023). Ensuring that every employee's work is directed towards fulfilling this mission is of paramount significance. This alignment not only enhances the institution's effectiveness but also maximizes its impact on regional development.

Furthermore, performance management and evaluation contribute to employee motivation and accountability. When employees know that their performance is being assessed, they are more likely to be committed and focused on their tasks (Dessler, 2018). In an environment where challenges are prevalent, maintaining high levels of motivation and accountability is crucial for organizational success. Performance management and evaluation are pivotal aspects of human resource planning in public universities in the Niger Delta region. They contribute to continuous improvement, addressing regional challenges, aligning with institutional goals, and fostering employee motivation and accountability. Effective performance management and evaluation processes ensure that the universities are well-equipped to fulfill their multifaceted missions and drive regional development.

Challenges and Opportunities in Human Resource Planning

By actively engaging with governmental bodies, local communities, industries, and nonprofit organizations, universities enhance their human resource planning strategies and contribute to the overall well-being of the Niger Delta region.

Financial Constraints and Resource Allocation: Financial constraints often pose a significant challenge to effective human resource planning in public universities, and this issue is particularly pronounced in the context of the Niger Delta region. The region, while rich in potential, faces numerous economic and environmental challenges. Limited financial resources can significantly impact the universities' ability to attract, retain, and develop the necessary talent to thrive in this complex environment (Fajana, 2018). These financial limitations can manifest in several ways. Firstly, they may lead to staffing shortages, particularly in critical academic and administrative positions. The inability to offer competitive compensation packages may result in difficulties in attracting and retaining high-caliber staff. In turn, this can affect the institution's overall quality and reputation. Secondly, inadequate funding can hinder the provision of professional development opportunities for existing staff. Without access to training and skill-enhancement programs, the workforce may become stagnant and less adaptable to the evolving educational and research landscape. Thirdly, financial constraints can limit investment in essential infrastructure and facilities, which are integral to providing a conducive and attractive environment for both employees and students.

Addressing these financial constraints and optimizing resource allocation is crucial for the successful human resource planning of public universities in the Niger Delta region. Universities must explore sustainable funding sources beyond government allocations. This may involve engaging in partnerships with industries, non-governmental organizations, and international donors. Diversifying funding streams reduces the reliance on a single source,

making universities less vulnerable to fluctuations in government funding (Olayiwola & Adeyeye, 2017). Universities should also prioritize allocation strategies to ensure that financial resources are directed towards areas of critical need. Cost-effective measures, such as energy efficiency and shared resources among universities, can help optimize the use of available funds.

Staff Retention and Talent Management: Staff retention is a pivotal concern for public universities in the Niger Delta. The region's specific challenges and opportunities demand a skilled and experienced workforce. High turnover rates not only disrupt institutional stability but also erode the knowledge base of an organization. Effective talent management strategies are indispensable for retaining competent staff and nurturing future leaders.

To address staff retention, public universities should implement comprehensive talent management practices. Career development programs are essential in this context (Armstrong, 2017). These programs offer employees opportunities for growth, advancement, and skill development. When employees perceive a clear path for career progression within the institution, they are more likely to remain committed and engaged in their roles. Mentorship programs can also be valuable. They provide experienced staff the opportunity to guide and support younger employees, transferring essential institutional knowledge and fostering a sense of belonging and career progression.

Recognizing and rewarding outstanding performance plays a pivotal role in staff retention. Public universities should establish systems for acknowledging and celebrating employee achievements. These recognitions can take various forms, including financial incentives, awards, or public acknowledgment. A culture of appreciation and acknowledgment not only enhances staff morale but also reinforces loyalty to the institution.

Cultural and Regional Factors Influencing HR Planning: The cultural and regional factors in the Niger Delta significantly influence human resource planning in public universities. The region's cultural diversity necessitates a nuanced and inclusive approach to HR planning (Pfeffer, 2023). Universities must respect the various cultural values and sensitivities of both their employees and students. Inclusivity in HR practices fosters a sense of belonging and equity among the diverse academic community. Furthermore, regional factors, such as environmental challenges and resource management, have a direct impact on the skills and competencies required from staff. HR planning must account for these factors by tailoring training and development programs to address these specific challenges. For instance, programs related to environmental studies and resource management are of particular significance in the Niger Delta region, where sustainability and conservation are critical concerns (Ite, 2016).

Collaboration with local communities and stakeholders is also essential for public universities in the Niger Delta to navigate regional complexities effectively. Partnerships with local communities can provide insights and support in addressing community-specific issues. Collaboration with governmental bodies is crucial for aligning HR planning with regional development goals. Partnerships with industries can help universities stay current with industry trends and demands, ensuring that their graduates are well-prepared for the job market (Nwaeke, 2019). These additional factors financial constraints, staff retention, and talent management, and cultural and regional influences are integral to the success of human resource planning in public universities in the Niger Delta region. By effectively addressing these factors, universities can ensure that they attract, develop, and retain the talent needed to fulfill their multifaceted missions and contribute to the socio-economic development of the region.

Collaboration and Partnerships with Stakeholders: In public universities in the Niger Delta region, collaboration and partnerships with various stakeholders are indispensable components of effective human resource planning. These institutions do not operate in isolation; they play a central role in the socio-economic development of the region. Therefore, collaborative efforts with governmental bodies, local communities, industries, and nonprofit organizations are fundamental for addressing regional challenges and leveraging opportunities. One of the key aspects of collaboration involves working closely with governmental bodies (Agabi, 2017). Government agencies often influence policies related to education, funding, and regional development. Public universities must actively engage with these entities to ensure that their human resource planning aligns with regional development goals and national policies. Collaborative relationships with governmental bodies can lead to increased funding, policy support, and the removal of bureaucratic obstacles.

Local communities are another essential stakeholder group that universities must engage with. Collaborative efforts with the local community provide universities with insights into community-specific challenges and needs. Public universities can contribute to the well-being of local communities by addressing issues such as environmental conservation, public health, and education. These collaborations are a win-win situation, as they enhance the universities' reputations and relationships with the community while also contributing to the community's development (Kamoche, 2021).

Industries and the private sector are crucial stakeholders for public universities in the Niger Delta region. These entities can provide valuable insights into the skills and competencies needed by graduates to meet industry demands. Collaborating with industries ensures that university programs remain relevant, and graduates are well-prepared for the job market. This collaboration can lead to opportunities for internships, research partnerships, and even direct support through research grants and infrastructure development (Fajana, 2019). Nonprofit organizations and international entities also play a significant role as stakeholders. They can provide funding for research, scholarships, and infrastructure development. These partnerships facilitate knowledge exchange and research collaboration, enabling universities to access external funding and expand their educational and research capabilities (Creswell, 2014). Collaboration and partnerships with stakeholders are integral to the success of human resource planning in public universities in the Niger Delta region. These relationships provide access to additional resources, expertise, and support for talent development and retention. They also facilitate knowledge exchange, research collaboration, and access to external funding.

METHODOLOGY

The study investigated "Optimizing Organizational Success in Public Universities of the Niger Delta Region through Strategic Human Resource Planning." This research employed a descriptive study design. The population of the study covers the entire male and female academic staff of public universities within the Niger Delta Region. The sample size of 3,240 academic staffs, comprises of 1,783 (55.1%) male and 1,457 (44.9%) female academic staff, was drawn using stratified random sampling technique focusing on 9 public universities within the Niger Delta Region. University of Port Harcourt-Choba, Imo State University, Delta State University, University of Uyo, Niger Delta University, University of Calabar, Ambrose Alli University Edo, Adekunle Ajasin University Ondo, Abia State University. The study utilized a self-structured

questionnaire, titled "Organizational Success through Human Resource Planning Questionnaire (OSHRPQ) to collect information from the respondents. The questionnaire maintains its two sections: Section A collects demographic data; while Section B comprises 25 questionnaire items addressing the 5 key research questions. Respondents rated questionnaire items on a 4-point Likert scale, ranging from 1 (Strongly Disagree) to 4 (Strongly Agree). The questionnaires were administered to the selected academic staff members, who were given sufficient time to complete and return them. Based on the distributed copies of 3,240 questionnaire instrument, and the manageable copies of 3,116 retrieved was used for data analysis of the study. Data collection is scheduled to take place over an extended period from May to November 2023, allowing for a more comprehensive and in-depth exploration of the research. To ensure the validity of the research instruments, expert validation is maintained. Measurement and evaluation experts from the academic community validated the instruments to enhance the questionnaire quality and relevance. Thereafter, the reliability of the questionnaire is determined using Cronbach's alpha, estimating an internal consistency coefficient of .821, indicating a high level of reliability. Descriptive statistics, such as means and standard deviations, was used to answer the research questions. While t-test statistic was employed to test research hypotheses at .05 level of significance. Both descriptive and inferential statistics were presented in table form for the interpretation of research findings. The data collected was analyzed using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) version 23.

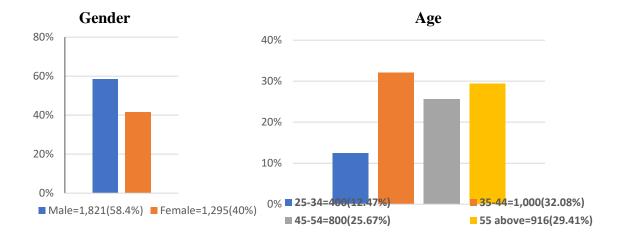

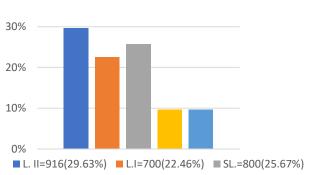

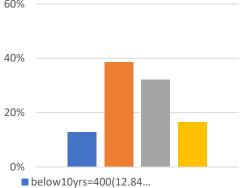
The table above shows the questionnaire distribution and retrieval. The researcher issued 3,240 copies of the questionnaire and retrieved 3,116 useful copies of the questionnaires, This represents 96% response rate and it was considered manageable for the study.

The gender distribution among the 3,116 respondents is noteworthy. It reveals that 58.4% (1,821) are male, while 41.6% (1,295) are female academic staff. This significant imbalance indicates a clear predominance of males in the survey sample. Such a gender skew could be due to various factors, including the field under study or the target population of the survey.

The age distribution within the sample reveals a multi-generational engagement with the survey's subject matter. The largest group, at 32.08% (1,000), falls within the 35–44 years category, indicating that this age group is particularly active or relevant in the context of the survey. Additionally, 29.41% (916) of respondents belong to the 55 and above category, demonstrating a broad spectrum of age groups. The remaining categories, 25–34 years and 45–54 years, contribute to the comprehensive age representation, ensuring that the survey captures insights from various life stages.

The academic rank distribution reflects a diverse range of positions among respondents. Notably, senior lecturers and lecturer II categories are the most dominant, representing 25.67% and 29.63% respectively, showcasing a significant presence of individuals in these academic positions. Additionally, 9.62% (300) of respondents are professors, and another 9.62% (300) are associate professors, indicating a respectable presence of senior academic staff. The category of lecturer I at 22.46% (700) further adds to the academic diversity of the sample.

Work experience is distributed across various ranges, offering insights into the professional backgrounds of the respondents. The largest group, at 38.49% (1,200), has 10-19 years of work experience, highlighting the presence of experienced professionals. Another 32.08% (1,000) have 20-29 years of experience, indicating a substantial group with considerable expertise. Additionally, 12.84% (400) have less than 10 years of experience, while 16.53% (516) have 30 years or more of experience. This wide range of experience levels among the respondents ensures that the survey captures perspectives from both early-career and highly experienced professionals as presented in Figure 1-4.

DATA ANALYSIS AND RESULTS

The process of data analysis is central to the study, as it allows the study to draw meaningful conclusions from the collected data. This process is employed to analyze and interpret the data. In this analysis, answers to the research questions are derived, with any score of 2.50 or higher

indicates acceptance, while any mean score falling below 2.50 represents a low mean score. Additionally, the five hypotheses were tested at a 0.05 level of significance using t-test statistics.

Research Question 1: How does workforce analysis and forecasting improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger-Delta region?

The figures in Table 2 present the results for research question 1, exploring how Workforce Analysis and Forecasting improves the achievement of organizational success in public universities within the Niger-Delta Region. The findings reveal a significant agreement among male and female lecturers in these institutions. Both gender groups agree on the role of workforce analysis and forecasting in realizing organizational success. The mean set values, averaging at 2.79, with a standard deviation of 0.95, reflect this unanimous viewpoint, emphasizing the perceived value of these processes in optimizing human resources and promoting success in educational institutions. This collective perspective reinforces the significance of workforce analysis and forecasting within the context of university education in the Niger-Delta Region.

Research Question 2: How does recruitment and talent acquisition strategies improve the achievement of organizational success of public universities in the Niger-Delta region, Nigeria?

Information in Table 3 presents the results for research question 2, which investigates how recruitment and talent acquisition strategies improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities within the Niger-Delta region, Nigeria. The data indicates a high level of agreement among both male and female lecturers regarding the significance of these strategies. The average grand mean of 2.88 and a standard deviation of 0.92 reflect the shared perspective of this alignment that both male and female lecturers recognize the pivotal role of recruitment and talent acquisition strategies in attracting qualified candidates, achieving success, enhancing staff retention, and fulfilling institutional objectives in the context of public universities within the Niger-Delta region, Nigeria. These findings underscore the importance of these strategies in the pursuit of organizational success.

Research Question 3: How does training and development programs improve the achievement of organizational success of public universities in the Niger-Delta region?

Data in Table 4 presents the results for research question 3, which investigates how training and development programs improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger-Delta region, the data analysis reveals a significant agreement among male and female lecturers. The mean set values rang from approximately 2.53 to 2.67, consistently reflect this shared perspective. Having the grand mean set of 2.62, with a standard deviation of 0.96, reinforces the overall agreement among the participants. This result emphasizes the recognition by both male and female lecturers of the vital role training and development programs play in enhancing staff motivation and engagement and, consequently, in achieving institutional objectives in public universities in the Niger-Delta region.

Research Question 4: How does succession planning and career development improve organizational success of public universities in the Niger-Delta region?

Table 5 presents the results for research question 4, which examined the role of succession planning and career development on the attainment of organizational success in public universities in the Niger-Delta region, the data analysis demonstrates a notable agreement among male and female lecturers. The data indicate that succession planning and career development initiatives significantly contribute to achieving organizational success within the context of public universities. Having the mean values ranging from approximately 2.56 to 2.75, consistently represent this agreement. The grand mean set of 2.64, with a standard deviation of 1.08, strengthens the overall agreement among the study's participants. This emphasizes the understanding of both male and female lecturers regarding the instrumental role of succession planning and career development in fostering staff commitment, grooming future leaders, and effectively implementing strategies that lead to success in public universities in the Niger-Delta region.

Research Question 5: How does performance management and evaluation improve organizational success of public universities in the Niger-Delta region, Nigeria?

Data in Table 6 presents the results for research question 5 aimed to understand the role of performance management and evaluation in enhancing organizational success in public universities in the Niger-Delta region. The result revealed that both male and female lecturers widely agree on the significance of performance management and evaluation processes in achieving success within this context. The mean set values in Table 6, which range from approximately 2.56 to 2.83, consistently indicate this shared perspective. With a Grand Mean Set of 2.67 and a standard deviation of 1.01, the overall agreement among respondents is reinforced. This harmonious viewpoint underscores that both male and female lecturers recognize the pivotal role of performance management and evaluation in promoting staff accountability, identifying areas for improvement, and enhancing the overall quality of education and services provided by public universities in the Niger-Delta region. This alignment emphasizes the understanding of the importance of these processes in the pursuit of organizational success.

Testing of the Hypotheses

HO₁. There is no significant difference between the mean rating of male and female lecturers on how workforce analysis and forecasting improve the achievement of organizational success of public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

The figures in Table 7 provides the results for the t-test analysis, showing that male lecturers had a mean rating of 2.72 with a standard deviation of 0.84, while female lecturers had a mean rating of 2.92 with a standard deviation of 0.95. The t-test statistic is calculated to be 1.22, and the critical t-table value is 0.12. The table shows that the t-test results indicate no statistically significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers in their perceptions of the influence of workforce analysis and forecasting on the achievement of organizational success. This means that both male and female lecturers hold similar views on the subject. Therefore, based on the data and the t-test results, the null hypothesis (HO1) is retained at 0.05 level of significance at 3,114 degree of freedom, signifying that there is no significant difference in the opinions of male and female lecturers regarding the impact of workforce analysis and forecasting on organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

HO₂: There is no significant difference between the mean rating of male and female lecturers on how recruitment and talent acquisition strategies improve the achievement of organizational success of public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

It shows that male lecturers had a mean rating of 2.65 with a standard deviation of 0.73, while female lecturers had a mean rating of 2.83 with a standard deviation of 0.94. The t-test statistic was calculated as 0.43, and the critical t-table value is 0.16. The table indicates that the t-test results revealed no statistically significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers in their opinions on how recruitment and talent acquisition strategies impact organizational success. In other words, both male and female lecturers share similar perceptions on this topic. Therefore, based on the data and the t-test results, the null hypothesis (HO2) is retained, signifying that there is no

significant difference between the views of male and female lecturers regarding the impact of recruitment and talent acquisition strategies on organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

HO₃: There is no significant difference between the mean rating of male and female lecturers on how training and development programs improve the achievement of organizational success of public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

Information in Table 9 provides the results for the t-test analysis. It shows that male lecturers had a mean rating of 2.76 with a standard deviation of 1.01, while female lecturers had a mean rating of 2.64 with a standard deviation of 1.05. The t-test statistic was calculated as 0.59, and the critical t-table value is 0.19. The table indicates that the t-test results revealed that there is no statistically significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers in their perspectives on how training and development programs improve organizational success. In other words, both male and female lecturers hold similar views on this topic. Based on the data and the t-test results, the null hypothesis (HO₃) is retained, indicating that there is no significant difference between the opinions of male and female lecturers regarding the influence of training and development programs on the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

HO₄: There is no significant difference between the mean rating of male and female lecturers on how succession planning and career development do not significantly improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

The t-test results show there is no statistically significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers in their perspectives on how succession

planning and career development improves organizational success. This implies that both male and female lecturers hold similar views on this topic. The data and the t-test results, the null hypothesis (HO4) is retained, suggesting that there is no significant difference between the opinions of male and female lecturers concerning the influence of Succession planning and career development on the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

Ho5: There is no significant difference between the mean rating of male and female lecturers on how performance management and evaluation improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

Information in Table 11 provides the results for the t-test analysis. It shows that male lecturers had a mean rating of 2.66 with a standard deviation of 1.01, while female lecturers had a mean rating of 2.54 with a standard deviation of 0.95. The t-test statistic was calculated as 0.59, and the critical t-table value is 0.19. The table indicates that the t-test results revealed there is no statistically significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers in their perspectives on how performance management and evaluation influence organizational success. This implies that both male and female lecturers share similar views on this topic. Based on the data and the t-test results, the null hypothesis (HO₅) is retained, suggesting that there is no significant difference between the opinions of male and female lecturers regarding the effect of performance management and evaluation on the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria.

DISCUSSION OF FINDINGS

The results of Hypothesis One, which investigated the influence of workforce analysis and forecasting on the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region, showed that there was no significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers. The results revealed a t-value of 1.22 exceeding the significance level of 0.05. This indicates that there was no significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers concerning how Workforce Analysis and Forecasting influence the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region. Similarly, DeCenzo (2018) contributed to the emphasis on the findings by emphasizing the profound impact of efficient workforce planning and forecasting on organizational success. Their research underlined that these processes are not just administrative tasks but pivotal drivers of improved performance and success. By emphasizing the correlation between workforce planning, organizational success, and positive outcomes, both studies echo the significance of recognizing

the value of Workforce Analysis and Forecasting in the context of public universities in the Niger Delta region.

These findings and the emphasis provided by Okurame and Obi (2016) and DeCenzo (2018) collectively highlight the unanimous recognition among male and female lecturers of the vital role of Workforce Analysis and Forecasting in enhancing organizational success. They underscore that this strategic practice is integral to optimizing human resources and driving performance in the educational sector. Therefore, the current study's results align with existing literature, indicating that both male and female lecturers in public universities in the Niger Delta region recognize the importance of Workforce Analysis and Forecasting as a valuable tool for achieving organizational success. These findings emphasize the need for universities in the region to continue investing in workforce planning and forecasting strategies to optimize human resource deployment and improve overall institutional success.

Recruitment and Talent Acquisition Strategies and Organizational Success

The findings of Hypothesis Two, which examined the effect of recruitment and talent acquisition strategies on organizational success in public universities within the Niger Delta region, are noteworthy. The results suggest no significant difference in mean ratings between male and female lecturers in their perception of how these strategies influence organizational success. The t-value calculated was 0.43, surpassing the predetermined significance level of 0.05. This implies that there is no substantial discrepancy in how male and female lecturers assess the impact of recruitment and talent acquisition strategies on the achievement of organizational success in the context of public universities in the Niger Delta region. The findings of Hypothesis two, which explored the effect of Recruitment and Talent Acquisition Strategies on the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region, are well supported by the scholarly works of Ololube (2017) and Azikiwe (2020).

Ololube (2017) underscored the pivotal role of strategic recruitment and talent acquisition in enhancing organizational performance. His research emphasized the need for organizations to attract candidates with the necessary qualifications and skills. Ololube argued that a strategic approach to recruitment ensures that organizations bring in individuals who are better suited to meet the specific requirements of the position, which subsequently contributes to achieving organizational success. His emphasis on the significance of attracting the right talent corresponds with the findings of this research, which reveal that both male and female lecturers agree on the importance of Recruitment and Talent Acquisition Strategies in the context of public universities in the Niger Delta region.

Furthermore, the study conducted by Azikiwe (2020) aligned with the findings of this research. Azikiwe's work emphasizes that effective recruitment and talent acquisition strategies are pivotal in achieving organizational success. He argued that organizations that prioritize these strategies are more likely to attract and retain top talent, ultimately leading to improved organizational performance. The agreement between the perspectives of male and female lecturers on this matter, as indicated by the t-value exceeding the significance level, reinforces the notion that Recruitment and Talent Acquisition Strategies are crucial in the achievement of organizational success within the academic setting. The alignment between the findings of this research and the emphasis of these two authors underscores the consensus that both male and female lecturers within the Niger Delta region share regarding the pivotal role of Recruitment

and Talent Acquisition Strategies in achieving organizational success in public universities. The studies by Ololube (2017) and Azikiwe (2020) provided scholarly support for the significance of these strategies in fostering success in organizational contexts. This gender-neutral perspective contributes to a unified understanding of the role of Recruitment and Talent Acquisition Strategies in the realm of higher education, confirming their substantial impact on the pursuit of success within public universities in the Niger Delta region.

Training and Development Programs and Organizational Success

Hypothesis three sought to understand how training and development programs improve the achievement of organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region. The results indicate that there was no significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers regarding the influence of Training and Development Programs on organizational success. The t-value of 0.59 exceeded the significance level of 0.05, suggesting a lack of significant gender-based variation in their perceptions. These findings resonate with the research conducted by Okonkwo and Ihajirika (2018) and Adepoju and Oladipo (2019).

Okonkwo and Ihajirika (2018) conducted a study emphasizing the importance of training and development programs in improving employees' performance and, subsequently, organizational success. Their research highlighted that well-structured training programs contribute to staff motivation and enhance overall performance. This perspective aligns with the findings of this study, which indicates that male and female lecturers share a common view on the impact of Training and Development Programs in public universities in the Niger Delta region.

Additionally, Adepoju and Oladipo (2019) conducted a study that focused on the connection between training programs and organizational performance. Their research found that training and development initiatives significantly contribute to the achievement of organizational success, emphasizing the role of staff training in improving overall performance. The fact that the findings of this research align with the perspectives of both male and female lecturers, as demonstrated by the t-value, reinforces the notion that Training and Development Programs are instrumental in enhancing organizational success within the academic context, the convergence between this study's results and the emphases of the two cited authors, Okonkwo and Ihajirika (2018) and Adepoju and Oladipo (2019), reaffirmed the consensus among male and female lecturers in the Niger Delta region. It underscores the shared perspective that Training and Development Programs significantly contribute to the achievement of organizational success in public universities. The alignment reinforces the idea that Training and Development Programs are indispensable tools in enhancing performance and success within the academic setting. By accommodating the training needs of both male and female faculty members, universities can foster a more conducive environment for the achievement of their organizational goals. Training and development should continue to be a core focus for academic institutions in the Niger Delta region, ensuring that faculty members have the necessary skills and knowledge to excel in their roles and contribute to the overall success of the universities.

Succession Planning and Career Development and Organizational Success

Hypothesis four aimed to investigate the influence of Succession Planning and Career Development on organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region. The results indicate that there was no significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers regarding the impact of Succession Planning and Career Development on organizational success. The t-value of 1.419 exceeded the significance level of 0.05, suggesting that gender-based differences in perceptions were not significant. These findings are consistent with the research of Okogbaa (2015) and Nwaeke (2019).

Okogbaa (2015) conducted a study that emphasized the importance of succession planning in higher education institutions. His research highlighted that effective succession planning ensures the continuity of leadership and the identification and grooming of future leaders within the institution, which is essential for organizational success. This perspective aligns with the results of this study, indicating that male and female lecturers share a common view on the impact of Succession Planning and Career Development in public universities in the Niger Delta region.

Nwaeke (2019) conducted research focused on the relationship between career development opportunities and employee commitment and loyalty. His study found that career development opportunities significantly contribute to staff commitment and loyalty to the organization. This aligns with the results of this research, which found that male and female lecturers have similar views regarding the impact of Career Development in public universities. The convergence between this study's results and the insights of Okogbaa (2015) and Nwaeke (2019) reinforces the consensus among male and female lecturers in the Niger Delta region. It underscores the shared perspective that Succession Planning and Career Development significantly contribute to the achievement of organizational success in public universities.

The findings of this research emphasize that universities in the Niger Delta region should prioritize succession planning and career development to ensure the continuous availability of capable leadership and to foster a committed and loyal workforce. By ensuring a clear path for career development, universities can encourage their faculty members to become more engaged, loyal, and committed to the institution's goals. Both male and female lecturers perceive these aspects as critical to enhancing organizational success within the academic context, making it essential for institutions to continue focusing on these areas.

Performance Management and Evaluation and Organizational Success

Hypothesis five aimed to explore the influence of performance management and evaluation on organizational success in public universities in the Niger Delta region. The results revealed that there was no significant difference between the mean ratings of male and female lecturers concerning how performance management and evaluation improves organizational success. The t-value of 0.59 exceeded the significance level of 0.05, indicating that gender-based differences in perceptions were not statistically significant. These findings are in alignment with the studies of Afolayan (2018) and Adesope (2017).

Afolayan's (2018) research emphasized the importance of performance management systems in educational institutions. The study highlighted that effective performance management contributes to staff accountability and responsibility, which, in turn, positively affects organizational success. These results are in congruence with the findings of this study, which indicate that male and female lecturers share a common viewpoint regarding the impact of performance management and evaluation in public universities.

Similarly, Adesope (2017) conducted research that examined the role of performance evaluation in identifying areas for improvement and professional growth in educational

institutions. His study found that regular performance evaluation is instrumental in helping staff members grow professionally and contribute to the organization's overall success. This aligns with the results of this research, which indicate that both male and female lecturers hold similar views on the impact of performance management and evaluation in public universities. The agreement between the results of this study and the insights from Afolayan (2018) and Adesope (2017) reinforces the consensus among male and female lecturers in the Niger Delta region. It underscores the shared perspective that Performance Management and Evaluation significantly contribute to the achievement of organizational success in public universities.

CONCLUSION

This study has explored the multifaceted realm of human resource planning practices and their profound influence on the attainment of organizational success in public universities within the Niger Delta region of Nigeria. The investigation scrutinized the impact of various dimensions of human resource planning, namely, workforce analysis and forecasting, recruitment and talent acquisition strategies, training and development programs, succession planning and career development, and performance management and evaluation, on the perceived success of these educational institutions. The research concludes that these institutions stand to benefit from the strategic utilization of workforce analysis, recruitment, talent acquisition, training, and development programs, as well as succession planning and performance management and evaluation. These findings collectively underscore the relevance of human resource planning in the higher education sector, emphasizing the need for practical implementation of these practices to bridge the gap between theoretical concepts and their real-world impact. Therefore, this study provides valuable insights for university administrators and policymakers to shape their strategies and promote organizational success in the Niger Delta region.

Recommendations

The following recommendations below aims to guide various stakeholders within public universities in the Niger Delta region, to harness the potential of human resource planning practices in achieving organizational success and excellence in higher education:

- Universities management should be encouraged to adopt systematic workforce analysis and forecasting practices, providing guidance on implementation to changing academic needs, and enhance overall institutional performance.
- University Human Resource Departments should employ effective recruitment strategies to attract candidates with the necessary skills and qualifications, while also focusing on talent acquisition methods to improve staff retention for achieving organizational goals.
- Human Resource Departments should acknowledge that training initiatives play a vital role in improving employee performance and driving the institution towards success, and invest in robust training and development programs to enhance staff motivation and engagement, ultimately contributing to improved organizational success.
- University leadership: prioritize succession planning to identify and groom future leaders within the institution, fostering loyalty and commitment among staff.

• The university quality assurance bodies should encourage public universities to adopt effective performance evaluation practices to ensure the delivery of high-quality educational services, enhanced accountability, identify areas for improvement, and elevate the overall quality of Niger-Delta universities.

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
